

the bilge pump to start working again. That night, I came up to discover only 1 of the 4 bilge pumps was working. I also discovered what I call a "water feature". It looked like one of those small desk fountains just bubbling away. I tried plugging it up from the inside with no luck, so the Black Raven II would have to depend on bilge pumps to keep it afloat until I was able to haul it in March.

Other than the obviously missing oakum and concrete in the seam with the water feature, the hull was in decent shape (below the water line). The steel plates, bolts and rudder weren't so great. Our very own Alan Thomle came by to look at the boat after I pulled the plywood patch on the starboard side. As you might expect, things weren't great behind the plywood patch. I told Alan we might as well pull the really bad stuff out; it isn't doing any good in the side of the boat. Next thing I know Alan has about 20 feet of the side opened up. We (and by we I mean Alan) ended up replacing 4 planks and at least 6 frames. A bit of a task when the planks are two inches thick and the frames are almost 4 inches wide. Lucky for me grandpa was a hoarder...errr... collector and among the things he collected was wood; 2 inch thick fir in this case. Yay grandpa, something I can use on a boat!



Along the way a number of other friends and family chipped in. My friends Brian, Bryn, Stephanie, Adam, Lincoln and Gabe to name a few. My mom, dad and sister came out to help as well. As boat projects go, we were working right up to the last minute. To the point we had to put plastic on the travel lift slings to keep the fresh paint from transferring.

One thing is for sure the Black Raven II draws a lot of attention. Until we put tarps up over the boat it was almost hard to get work done. Everyday someone was coming by asking about the boat. You could hear people going to Scuttlebutts talking about the boat. On a side note, having a brewery in the boatyard is both a blessing and curse.






PRESIDENT'S CORNER

2016 Lake Oswego Classic Boat Show

The Columbia Willamette chapter of the A.C.B.S. invites all vintage boating enthusiasts to attend their 17th annual Classic Boat Show at Lake Oswego, Oregon. This show, sponsored by the Oswego Heritage Council, offers several unique features that make it a "must see" event for all fans of classic boating. Lake Oswego is an upscale community south of Portland, Oregon surrounding a private lake not normally open to the public. Cleaning of the outer hull of all boats admitted to the Lake, is required to eliminate the threat of invasive species. However, the cleaning is not harmful to wooden boats, and will be provided free of charge to show participants.

The Lake Oswego Show is unique among A.C.B.S shows on the West coast in that it encompasses three venues, with cruisers and a restored World War II PT boat on the Willamette River, small boats and runabouts on Oswego Lake, and a 250 vehicle collector car show at a nearby city park. A free shuttle bus operates between the three venues. These attractions combined with shopping opportunities in the adjacent upscale shopping community assure entertainment for all attendees.

The festivities begin on Friday night August 26 with a wine and appetizer reception for all boat display registrants. The next day show registrants may launch their boats on the lake and enjoy the day exploring its wide variety of architecturally significant homes and boat houses. Activities culminate in a steak and salmon dinner at the historic Oswego Heritage House museum. Judging for the numerous show trophies will occur Sunday morning August 28th followed by a water skiing show at 1:00pm, and culminating in the trophy award ceremony at 2:30 pm.

Because dock space for on- water display on Oswego Lake or the Willamette River is limited, and seating at the Saturday night dinner is similarly constrained, we encourage interested parties to register early. Registration can be accomplished on- line by going to OswegoHeritage.org /events/ Car and Boat Show. The registration fee for A.C.B.S. members is only \$10 per boat, and the reservations for the Saturday night dinner is \$30 per person. Fees can be paid via a secure PayPal transaction.
